

etting away from it all is getting to be a weekend habit. A country cottage or cabin, informal and RELAXED, offers a quick refresher—a peaceful oasis in our hectic lives. For a shopping center developer, his fashion retailer wife and their two children, greener pastures are but a 90-minute drive from their Washington, D.C., home.

Nestled in a landscape rich with wildlife in Maryland's Talbot County, their retreat sits on the historic Tred Avon River. Here, escape from workaday cares is found in FAMILY STYLE entertaining.

"It's paradise," says the owner. "I want-

ed something like a barn, something that had a rustic, homey, warm, comfortable feeling—something that looked like it belonged on the property."

So he commissioned Versaci, Neumann, and Partners, Architects, of Washington, D.C., to design a hideaway that mirrored the traditional styling of the 19th-century houses already on the site. Designer Celeste Hart brought her eye for DETAIL to the cozy, airy space. What was the result? A friendly getaway that doesn't skimp on creature comforts. Inviting and unpretentious, it reflects the family's country tastes and PERSONAL STYLE.

rom a distance, it's difficult to tell whether this Colonial-style cottage is old or new, large or small. "Because of the roof line, it doesn't look imposing," says the owner. "But when you get inside, the volume of space has a big impact."

The pitched roof soars 16 feet, but beams bring the interior down to human scale. Eight-foot-high French doors and double-hung windows let the family enjoy their idyllic surroundings-and keep an eye on poolside action. A second bath, accessible only from outside, and an adjacent outdoor shower reduce the indoor traffic. The brick floor ensures good looks and easy maintenance, while the painted roughhewn cypress walls and vintage heart pine beams in the living area provide a PARED DOWN, soothing backdrop for the owners' colorful collection of 18th- and 19th-century American antiques. To complete the rustic look, Celeste Hart chose limestone for the extended hearth and the kitchen counter. which tops a variety of appliances. Neatly designed, this LITTLE RETREAT stylishly proves that good things can, indeed, come in small packages.
